Sessions A – Monday, June 9, 10:45 am – noon

Session A-1:

Title: Building Relationships Between Fundraisers and Fund Administrators

Type: Presentation

Presenters: Kirsten Darling is the Specialist - Strategy and Partnerships at the University of Alberta. She has worked within Student Financial Support in various roles for the past 20 years and has been in her current role for 1.5 years. Her role is to support the work of the Advancement folks who steward donors by providing guidance around policy, procedure and institutional priorities. The result of this work is a framework of funding that supports a diverse student body. Kristen is a hockey mom of two, and we enjoy spending as many days as we can at our lake on the boat or camping in the wilderness. Co-presenter **Fiona Halbert**, Assistant Registrar and CASFAA Secretary, has been with the University of Alberta for nearly 20 years. She has successfully led Student Financial Support through several organizational transitions over the years. She is also an active sports and dog mom who enjoys travelling.

Description: This session will share learnings with regards to building trust and fostering relationships with fundraisers and Development folks. As Student Financial Support works closely with our fundraisers and Development experts, it is important that we can exchange ideas and information freely in a collaborative environment. Attendees will come away with new ideas as to how this kind of relationship can be fostered. This will also be an opportunity for colleagues to share their experiences and best practices in their work.

Session A-2:

Title: Scholarship Non-Renewal Practices: Balancing Academic Integrity with Compassion

Type: Presentation

Presenter: Michael Heighton is the Scholarship and Admissions Officer for St Francis Xavier University. After a 10-year career in IT within the private sector, Michael joined StFX in July 2024 to coordinate the entrance and application-based scholarship programs at the university. He is also co-chair of the 2025 CASFAA conference committee.

Description: This session will focus on the challenges of managing award-based renewals where academic merit is prioritized over financial need. Best practices in managing scholarship non-renewal appeals processes, including the benefits of developing a standardized non-renewal appeals process as compared to ad-hoc decision making, will be discussed. Micheal was instrumental in introducing an appeal process at StFX in summer 2024 that is both visible and trauma-informed in its approach. Attendees will also be encouraged to share their own experiences and best practices in this area of award adjudication.

Session A-3:

Title: 30 days to 3 hours - NSLSC Batch Processing at U Calgary

Type: Presentation

Presenter: Joel Dooley-May, MEd, Assistant Registrar, Student Financial Support at University of Calgary. Joel has been directly involved in all things Student Financial Support for 15 years. He is currently the CASFAA Regional Director for Alberta, Northwest Territories and Nunavut and the Past-President of the Alberta Student Awards Personnel Association (ASAPA). His passion is team development and creating efficiencies to allow his team the capacity of develop. Joel is certified in change management and lean six sigma and using the tools to streamline operations and make changes to enhance student experience. Outside of work he spends as much time as he can with his wife and four-year-old daughter.

Description: Joel will share the experiences of his team with NSLSC batch processing at the University of Calgary, where they were able to take their processing time from 30 days to just 3 hours. Efficient use of the batch processing feature within the NSLSC Electronic Confirmation of Enrolment has allowed the team to

connect students with their funding faster and take back time in their collective schedules for other projects and supports. Joel will share how this was accomplished and how your school may do the same.

Session B-1:

Title: How Do You Use AI In Your Work? (Part 1)

Type: Round-Table Discussion

Presenters: Sheryl Trimm, BBA, is the Manager, Student Finance at Cape Breton University. She brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to her work in student finance, having worked in both private and public post-secondary education settings during her varied career. Sheryl currently serves as the CASFAA Regional Director for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and is a member of the 2025 conference planning committee. In her spare time, she enjoys travelling with her family to new destinations and relaxing on the beautiful waters of Cape Breton Island.

Description: The effects of artificial intelligence (AI) in the classroom and the workplace are undeniable, our reactions to them can be varied. Do you worry that AI is replacing traditional student engagement in the award application process? Has AI helped to streamline activities and improve performance in your office or among your staff? Do you want to start exploring how AI might assist you in your work but don't know where to start? Do you have AI tips and tricks you could share with your fellow financial administrators? In this round-table discussion, host Shery will offer attendees a space to ask questions, discuss fears, share successes, and explore uses of AI in the work that we do.

Title: Prestige Award Selection - Moving Toward the Future

Title: Supporting Access to Post-Secondary Education through the Canada Student Financial Assistance Program

Type: Virtual Presentation

Presenter: Jonathan Wallace is Director General of the Canada Student Financial Assistance Program – a position he has held since April 2021. In this capacity, he is responsible for leading policy development, operations, and other activities to achieve the program's mission to support access to post-secondary education for Canadians. Prior to that, Jonathan was Executive Director of the Temporary Foreign Worker Program, where he led policy and regulatory changes to improve protections for migrant workers. Jonathan has also held executive roles as Director of Planning, Integrity and Repayment with the Canada Student Financial Assistance Program, and Senior Advisor to the Deputy Minister of Labour. Over the course of his 21-year career with the Public Service, he has also held policy-focused roles at Employment and Social

Development Canada and the Department of Finance. Jonathan enjoys leading teams and coaching employees for success, and loves to see people grow and realize their full potential. He values relationships, high quality work, evidence-based analysis, and achieving results. He also has a particular interest in fostering diversity and inclusion in the workplace. Most of all, Jonathan is grateful for the privilege of being a part of the Public Service, and in that regard, for contributing towards improving the lives of Canadians, strengthening trust and confidence in government, and supporting a free, democratic society. Title: An Introduction to Scholarship Manager by Nextgen Web Solutions and A Case Study in Transforming Student Awards Management at Athabasca University

Presenters: Dianne Fanning, VP Software Solutions Sales, Next Gen Web Solutions, has 25+ years of experience helping grow technology businesses in higher education, K-12, and government markets. Her responsibilities have included product definition, system implementation, user training and customer support. She graduated from Trinity University in Washington, D.C. with a BA in business administration. With over 25 years of experience at Athabasca University (AU), Valerie Olver, Coordinator, Student Awards, responsibilities have mostly included the coordination of the student financial aid and awards operations in the Office of the Registrar. Since 2022, Val has focused on leading the university's Student Awards Transformation project, where she has played a key role in implementing Scholarship Manager by Nextgen Web Solutions. Val has been helping the university improve its award systems for students, administrators, and donors alike. She is excited to share the lessons learned and the benefits AU has gained through this transformation and is always eager to explore new ways to make award management efficient for everyone involved.

Description: Managing student awards and bursaries can be complex, resource-intensive, and difficult to scale, especially when trying to meet the evolving needs of students, administrators, and donors. This session introduces Scholarship Manager by Nextgen Web Solutions as a transformative and flexible digital solution designed to streamline and simplify the entire student awards lifecycle. See how Scholarship Manager supports institutions in tackling common challenges such as managing high volumes of applications, dealing with varying eligibility criteria, accessing financial need, conducting timely reviews, and optimizing fund utilization. The platform also enhances student engagement with a user-friendly interface, while offering powerful tools to support communication, flexible reporting and enhanced donor relationship and stewardship activities. Athabasca University will share a case study on its Student Awards

Transformation project, including key highlights from the implementation of Scholarship Manager. Whether you're beginning your digital transformation journey or looking to update your current awards management processes, this session offers valuable insights and practical takeaways.

Session C-2:

Title: FAOs You're Not On Your Own

Type: Presentation

Presenter: Suzanne Tyson, CEO, Points for School, has been working in the post-secondary funding field for close to two decades. Her role as President of Studentawards.com provided her with a deep appreciation for student funding needs and their struggle to access government awards, scholarships, bursaries and other forms of funding. She founded HigherEdPoints in 2013 and in its 10 years of existence helped students and families offset more than \$3.6 Million in tuition and student loans by using their loyalty points. In 2024, with the sponsorship of Guard Me International Insurance, Suzanne launched Points For School, which will expand on the foundation she built with HigherEdPoints. In addition to tuition and student loans, Points for School will enable parents to fund RESPs with their loyalty points, as well as reaching out to international students pre-arrival to set them up for financial success during their studies.

Description: Financial Aid Officers' roles are far more complex and demanding than ever before, partly because today's students' needs often extend beyond financial support alone. If navigating funding options for in-course students was made easier for FAOs, time could be better spent helping to resolve the non-financial challenges our students are facing. While it's true that many large awards are only open to graduating high school/CEGEP students, it is a myth that there is no funding out there for in-course students. This session will focus on providing FAOs with shareable resources and tips about funding and other options available to help in-course students persist and complete their education. As is always the case with Suzanne's sessions, a relaxed setting and interactive discussion will be encouraged.

Session C-3:

Title: Breaking Silos: Strengthening Campus Collaboration for Student Success

Type: Presentation

Presenter: Aimee Macdonald (she/her) is a Gender and Sexual Diversity Advisor at St. Francis Xavier University (STFX), where she provides education and support to the campus community while advocating for 2SLGBTQIA+ rights. Holding a Bachelor of Information Systems from STFX (2002), a Post-Graduate Management Certificate in Human Resource Management from BCIT (2009), and a Master's in Adult Education in Community Development (2025). In addition to her professional work, Aimee is a dedicated mom of two children, two dogs, and a cockatiel, and she engages in rescue work with her family in their spare time. Aimee's passion lies in creating inclusive communities and empowering individuals through education and advocacy. Brendan Roberts recently graduated from StFX with a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Public Policy and Governance with a Subsidiary in Political Science. During his time as a student, Brendan was heavily involved on campus, most notably through his work with the Students' Union, serving is various roles including Vice President Finance and Operations, President, and Chair of the Board of Directors. Through his work with the Students' Union, Brendan oversaw the administration of an emergency grants program aimed at providing rapid financial relief to students who were in emergency situations that prevented them from continuing with their studies. Since graduating, Brendan has moved to Halifax and now serves as the Executive Director of a small non-profit advocacy group called Students Nova Scotia. Coach Gary Waterman enters his 17th season as Head Coach, and his 20th season overall with the StFX X-Men Football coaching staff. The six-time AUS Coach of the Year has won six AUS championship titles as Head Coach. Coach Waterman was also named the 2022 U SPORTS Coach of the Year. Mary Fisher-MacDonnell began working at St. Francis Xavier University in 2005 and will enter her eleventh year in September as a member of the StFX Office of the Registrar in the role of Financial Aid Officer. Title: People Before Paperwork: A Person-Centered Approach to Financial Aid

Mary Fisher-MacDonnell began working at St. Francis Xavier University in 2005 and will enter her eleventh year in September as a member of the StFX Office of the Registrar in the role of Financial Aid Officer. Whether you're new to person-centered practices or looking to deepen your approach, this session will offer practical tools, reflective insights, and space for open Q&A. Join us to reimagine financial aid as a space where students feel seen, heard, and supported.

Session D-2:

Title: Continuing the Conversation - Best Practices in Processing Title IV Loans, Alternative/Private Loans, and Veterans Affairs Benefits

Type: Round-Table Discussion

Presenters: Jiffin Arboleda and **Bianca Novielli** are both Senior Financial Aid Specialists at the University of Toronto. They jointly oversee the US financial aid portfolio at the University Registrar's Office, which includes processing US Title IV/Direct Loans applications, Sallie Mae and Earnest Loans certification requests, and US Veterans Affairs educational benefits. They are also actively involved in the re-certification and annual audit review processes for US Direct Loans.

Description: At this round-table discussion, Jiffin and Bianca will share the best practices that they use, the challenges that they face and the questions they ask or are asked when processing US funding, including Title IV, alternative/private loans such as Sallie Mae or Earnest loans, and Veterans Affairs educational benefits. In this role, Sana oversees the daily operations of financial aid programs, including scholarships, awards, bursaries, and student loan funding. With over seven years of experience in the sector, Sana is committed to improving access and affordability through student-centered practices. Marcelo Cisterna, is a Financial Aid Advisor, Fees & Financial Aid at MacEwan University, bringing over a decade of experience as an educator and administrator in post-secondary education. His expertise lies in guiding students through financial aid processes, ensuring they receive the necessary support for academic success. Marcelo's commitment to education and student development has been a consistent theme throughout his career.

Description: As affordability continues to shape the post-secondary landscape, institutions are increasingly relying on bursaries as a tool to support students. This round-table session offers an opportunity to engage in a focused conversation about how entrance bursaries are used, governed, and assessed. The session will delve into how and when bursaries are leveraged during the admissions cycle or academic year. It will also provide an opportunity to share insights, discuss challenges, and learn from peer institutions across Canada. Sana and Marcelo's goal is to create a collaborative space where both emerging and established practices are discussed openly, with a focus on continuous improvement and student success.

Title: Understanding Finastra's Role in Canadian Student Aid

Type: Presentation

Presenters: Marc Guindon is the multitasking maestro behind student lending at Finastra, where he juggles titles like Manager of Educational Institutional Relations and Services for Student Lending, and Customer Success Lead for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island—because one province just isn't enough. Since 2002, Marc has been the go-to guy for making student lending smoother than a freshly laminated diploma. Whether he's championing CSFA initiatives or translating institutional needs into action, Marc is on a mission to make the student experience better, brighter, and a whole lot more efficient—one strategic meeting (and probably one coffee) at a time.

Description: Have you ever wondered how Finastra fits into the government aid landscape in Canada? Do you understand its role in facilitating funding and repayment for students? In this session Marc will begin with a brief overview of what Finastra does and then open the floor for your questions about its programming and supports.

Title: Powering Up Scholarships: Smarter Data, Better Decisions

Presenters: Joanne Salem holds a Bachelor of Business Administration in Psychology and another in Industrial Relations from the Université de Montréal. She later completed an MBA at HEC Montréal in 2021. For the past ten years, Joanne have been working at HEC Montréal as a Team Leader for Scholarships and Financial Aid. **Joanne Diwan** (JD) also studied at HEC Montréal and earned an MBA from the University of

Ottawa. She has been with HEC Montréal for 11 years and currently serves as the Director of Student Community Services, overseeing student life, scholarships, and financial aid.

Description: Join Joanne and JD as they share how Power BI is transforming the way they analyze scholarship data and can help institutions make more informed and strategic decisions. By centralizing and visualizing key metrics such as scholarship offerings over the years, application trends, and recipient profiles, administrators can uncover valuable insights that drive efficiency and equity in their distribution. Joanne and JD will showcase how the team at HEC Montréal leverages Power BI to track and interpret scholarship data, improving their understanding of application patterns and funding allocation. Through dynamic dashboards and data visualization, they gain a clearer picture of trends, enabling them to optimize processes and better support students. This session will be beneficial for professionals managing scholarships, admissions, and financial aid, as well as those looking to enhance their institution's data-driven decision-making. Attendees will leave with practical insights into how they can use Power BI to work smarter with their statistics, ensuring a more efficient and impactful approach to award management.

Session E-3:

Title: Moving From a Financial Hardship Bursaries Program to a Support Service for Students in Financial

Difficulty

Type: Presentation

Presenters: This group of colleagues is joining us from Université Laval. **Francis Brousseau** has been working in the Office of Awards & Financial Aid for over 20 years, most recently as the director for 11 years. **Pascale Desrochers** has been responsible for the government financial aid sector for six years. She is part of the team of advisors who provide support to students in financial difficulty.

France Gratton joined the team more than three years ago. She oversees federal and provincial research grants and other merit-based scholarships. France is also part of the team of advisors who provide support to students in financial difficulty.

Description: Francis, Pascale, and France will present the transformation of their service offered to students in financial hardship. Previously, Université Laval had an application-based bursary program always available to students in financial difficulty. This program has moved from one that involved little contact with staff to one that is referral based and can now include one-on-one meetings, temporary bursary support, and personalized financial counselling. A new file documentation system also allows for better monitoring if the student requests services again. The aim of this presentation is to share the team's positive experience of transforming their service with colleagues.
